

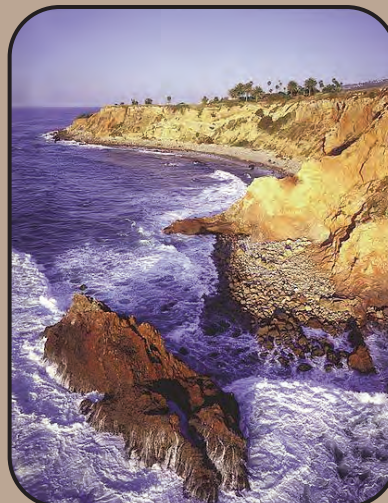

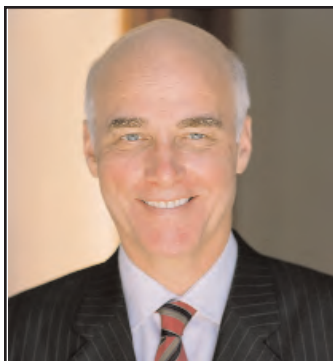
On the legislative front, there are a handful of bills affecting CSPS members. The Legislative Committee is reviewing these bills to formulate our positions.

Although no new bill has been introduced that repeats AB832 (Jones) from last year requiring physician owned outpatient surgery settings to be licensed by the state, the Department of Public Health is still interested in pursuing legislation on this issue which makes tracking the "spot" bills critically important.

Other issues that will be covered in the legislative report deal with outpatient surgery settings and AB583 (Hayashi) which CSPS is co-sponsoring with the California Medical Association (CMA) requiring health care practitioners to provide more information to patients on their training and qualifications.

We are also involved with the Department of Managed Health Care and their proposed regulations to regulate discount health plans. CSPS has historically been very active on this issue and has taken a position that these discount health plans are illegal.

These issues and more will be discussed at the CSPS Annual Meeting, so be sure to be there to be updated and enjoy the weekend.

Standing on the most southwesterly point of the Palos Verdes Peninsula, Point Vicente Lighthouse has long been one of this area's jewels. To the landsman, the lighthouse is scenic delight and continual attraction to sightseers, tourists, photographers and painters. To the mariner, the lighthouse is an aid to navigation which marks the northern end of the Catalina Channel on the Pacific coast. It helps him plot his position and warns him to avoid the rocky shoals which surround the nearby shore and, in a heavy fog, its horn will warn him if he gets too close to the dangerous shore. The tower and a small museum are open to the public.

Portuguese Bend

This mile-long stretch of road experiences some of the most dramatic geological shifts anywhere. Located just east of Abalone Cove Shoreline Park, this area has seen more than 100 homes lost to landslides since 1956. A drive along provides plenty of evidence of the area's infamous geologic history as the road is crooked and bumpy in many parts.

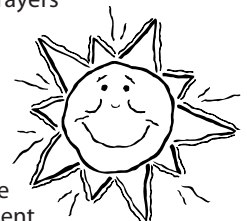

ANNUAL MEETING PROGRAM AND FACULTY

GENERAL EDUCATION INFORMATION

The California Society of Plastic Surgeons (CSPS) seeks to see beyond the traditional functions of continuing medical education, and challenges itself to become a catalyst for, an advocate for, and a provider of education that promotes improved competence, performance, and patient outcomes in plastic surgery.

Purpose: Our CME program seeks to provide high-quality, evidence-based educational opportunities designed to advance plastic surgeon competence, enhance practice performance, and promote patient safety to ultimately improve patient outcomes in the populations served by the plastic surgeons we educate.

Content: Our educational offerings include, but are not limited to, updates in clinical plastic surgery (aesthetic and reconstructive), reviews of current or best practice recommendations for plastic surgery care, evaluation of new and emerging technologies and techniques in plastic surgery, as well as patient safety.

Target Audience: We seek to serve not only the educational needs of plastic surgery healthcare professionals (board-certified plastic surgeons, plastic surgery residents and fellows, nurses and office staff) involved in the provision of plastic surgery services within the state of California, but the needs of local, regional, and national healthcare professionals and colleagues as well.

Types of Activities: As a CME provider for the largest plastic surgery state society in the country, the CSPS' educational activities include, but are not limited to, lectures, panel sessions, paper presentations, clinical round table discussions, and instructional courses. The educational design, instructional method and learning format for each event is chosen to best serve the educational needs and learning objectives of the planned educational activity.

Expected Results: We expect participants to report improved competence as expressed by greater confidence and knowledge in their approach to clinical problems or by an intent to change their behavior and apply newly acquired strategies in their practice. We expect participants will have greater confidence they are delivering care that promotes patient safety. In addition, if evaluated within the clinical practice setting, we expect improved performance parameters or a favorable impact on patient outcomes.

The General Sessions will consist of panel presentations on timely subjects which affect the plastic surgery specialty. Papers will also be presented during the general sessions. These papers are on various clinical topics and include summaries of research, observations based on experience, clever tricks to handle difficult problems, new instrumentation, development of new technologies, trends, statistics, safety issues and other comments about clinical practice that may be of value. The CSPS will also address cultural and linguistic competency issues and is dedicated to providing the participants with the necessary data, assessment tools and the development of resources that plastic surgeons may use in their practices to address these issues.

The overall objective of the general sessions is to present topics that are related to the core body of knowledge for plastic surgery, as well as increasing quality in the health care delivery system. The content will also cover innovative, recent and new research related topics of importance to the practice of plastic surgery.

The instructional courses address the topics of difficult rhinoplasty cases, post-bariatric body contouring, an ACLS Training Course, and a CPR course.

All recommendations presented and scientific research presented must be based on evidence that is accepted within the profession of

plastic surgery and must conform to the generally accepted standards of experimental design, data collection and analysis.

There will be question and answer sessions provided for each activity and we encourage you to use this time to address a difficult case that you may have, query the speakers on their techniques, etc.

The CSPS takes responsibility for the contact, quality and scientific integrity of its CME activities. As such, the CSPS follows the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education's Standards for Commercial Support. 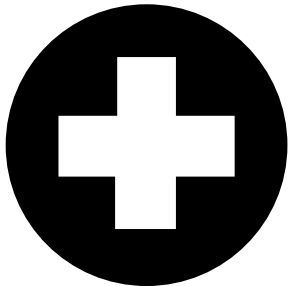

Please review the following for a brief overview of the Foundation.

MISSION: The California Society of Plastic Surgeons Educational and Research Foundation (CSPSERF) was incorporated in California as a not-for-profit public charity meeting the criteria of IRS Section 501 (c) (3). The mission of the Foundation is to identify and pursue, through directed research, education, and charitable contributions, various issues relevant to the advancement, effectiveness and safety of plastic surgery.

INITIAL FOCUS: The CSPSERF intends to focus its initial efforts on providing reconstructive surgery to California's children, age 18 and under, who demonstrate a need for such services. Participation will be open to the public, meaning all California children under that age of 18. There will be no fee for participation.

This initial CSPSERF program will be focused on the uninsured and underinsured children of California. While CSPSERF envisions that ultimate decisions regarding the need for surgery will be made on a case-by-case, fact-specific basis, it is also envisioned that the income guidelines of the California Health Family Program will be applied. These guidelines, for example, currently indicate that a family of six should have an income of not greater than \$71,400 in order to be eligible under CSPSERF's reconstructive surgery for children program.

A CSPSERF Committee has been formed to review and screen applications, following which recommendations will be made to CSPSERF's Full Board. Ultimately, the Board will decide which families and/or children will be recipients of services under the Foundation's program aimed at providing reconstructive surgery to the child in need.

MEMBERSHIP: The membership of the CSPSERF shall consist of persons, corporations or not-for-profit organizations that are interested in supporting the stated mission of this organization. Membership will not be restricted on the basis of race, religion, color, sex, age or creed. Members from the lay public are welcome and need not be plastic surgeons. Categories of membership shall consist of: (a) Charter, (b) Active, (c) Life, (d) Organizational, (e) President's Leadership Council, (f) Honorary, and (g) Public and are defined, in part, below:

(a) **CHARTER.** Defined in the first column.

(b) **ACTIVE.** Active members in the Foundation is available to individuals who wish to participate in the Foundation's activities and programs, who make a minimum annual donation to the Foundation of at least two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) and agree to abide by the Foundation's Bylaws. This class of membership shall be made up initially of the Charter members. Active members shall enjoy all privileges of membership including the right to vote and hold office.

(c) **LIFE.** Life membership is available to Active Members who have maintained Active Membership in the Foundation for at least ten consecutive years. After at least ten consecutive years of Active Membership, Life Membership requires a payment of the financial contribution to the Foundation at a minimum of three thousand dollars (\$3000) [re-evaluated every five (5) years.] Life Members shall enjoy all of the privileges of active membership.

(d) **ORGANIZATIONAL.** Organizational members shall be corporations, not-for-profits, or other organizations that wish to support the mission of the Foundation and meet the established contribution levels. The minimum annual contribution required to establish and thereafter maintain Organizational Membership shall be ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) [re-evaluated every five years.] Each Organizational member will select an individual to represent the organization as an Active member of the Foundation.

(e) **PRESIDENT'S LEADERSHIP COUNCIL.** The President's Leadership Council is a category of membership for individuals who have donated fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) [amount to be re-evaluated every five years] or more to the Foundation. These members will receive additional benefits as determined by the Board of Directors.

(f) **HONORARY MEMBERSHIP.** Honorary Members, who are no longer in active practice, are selected by the Board for their significant contributions to the Foundation and to provide historical institutional memory to the Board. Emeritus members shall enjoy all rights and privileges of Active membership and may be invited to attend board meetings.

(g) **PUBLIC MEMBERS.** Public Members shall consist of individual (non organizational) members of the general public who wish to contribute to the foundation. There shall be no minimum contribution required to be a Public Member.

CURRENT CSPSERF STATUS: The CSPSERF is classified as a Public Charity and is exempt from Federal income tax under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions made to the CSPSERF are deductible under section 170 of the Internal Revenue Code.

LEGISLATIVELY SPEAKING, WHERE ARE WE?

TIM MADDEN, CSPS LEGISLATIVE ADVOCATE

The state finds itself facing a huge budget deficit of nearly \$20 billion. The Governor is threatening to make cuts, many of which are to the State health programs. The Legislature has floated the idea of new taxes and the Republicans have promised to block any new taxes. The Democrats in turn say they are not interested in raising taxes but rather increasing "fees". The Republicans promise to sue if "fees" are increased and here we go again!

There have been signs the economy is improving so the Legislature desires to wait before having serious budget discussions in hopes the economy continues to improve thus reducing the need to make deep cuts. At the end of this report are a few of the cuts the Governor has proposed as I described in an earlier legislative report from January.

The legislative introduction deadline for 2010 just passed and there were nearly 2000 bills introduced. Among other bills, the CSPS is currently following:

AB 583 (Hayashi) – CSPS Position – Support

CSPS is the sponsor of this legislation. The California Medical Association is a co-sponsor.

AB 583 will require health care practitioners to disclose to patients, prior to initiating treatment, their license status and highest level of degree received and additionally requires physicians to disclose their board certification. The bill would also require physicians, who supervise more than one office location, to post the hours they are present at each office.

Oftentimes patients consult with a CSPS plastic surgeon after receiving what the patient believes is a poor outcome. When patients learn they were treated by a non-physician or a physician not board certified in plastic surgery they are surprised. Patients are confused with the numerous varieties of health care practitioners currently performing medical procedures.

Key Points

- Patients are confused over the qualifications of health care practitioners. This confusion has led to patients being harmed by under qualified health care practitioners.
- Patients are better served and protected if they are more educated and informed about each health care professional that may treat them.
- AB 583 will help patients better understand the training and education of their health care practitioner allowing them to make safer, more educated decisions.



SB 1150 (Negrete McLeod) – CSPS Position – Support

SB 1150 is a reintroduction of SB 674 which was vetoed by the Governor last year. This bill contains a number of provisions to better protect patients including improving the accreditation process for physician owned outpatient surgery settings, requiring the Medical Board of California to post a fact sheet on cosmetic surgery procedures, as well as requiring health care providers to include additional information in all advertisements.

Key Points

- Patients having cosmetic procedures are safer in accredited facilities than they are having the same procedures performed in a hospital.
- The provisions in SB 1150 codify many practices already in place with accrediting organizations to further protect patients.
- Having a fact sheet on cosmetic procedures on the Medical Board website will educate patients on what questions to ask their health care practitioner prior to having a cosmetic procedure performed.

AB 2566 (Carter) – CSPS Position – Support

AB 2566 is a reintroduction of AB 252 which was vetoed by the Governor last year. This bill would specify that corporations violating the corporate practice of medicine by contracting with physicians to perform elective cosmetic procedures would be subject to higher penalties and face possible jail time.

Key Points

- Current fines are not sufficient to deter corporate entities running medispas from violating the corporate practice of medicine.
- These same entities have created business management and franchising schemes that involve hiring "medical directors" who serve as "consultants" for the medical spas to get around the prohibition against the corporate practice of medicine.
- Patients are being harmed when the "medical director" in these corporate owned medispas does not provide any supervision over mid level health care practitioners performing medical procedures.
