We are happy that AB 583 passed which will require health care practitioners to disclose their type of license, highest level of academic degree and board certification to their patients. We are still dealing with legislative attempts to further regulate our office ORs, this time in the form of SB 100. Our legislative advocates have been working with the sponsor of the bill, Senator Curren Price, to help shape it into one that will serve our goal of improving patient safety without creating onerous requirements such as mandated licensure by the Department of Public Health.

These issues and more will be discussed at the CSPS Annual Meeting, so be sure to be there to be updated and enjoy the weekend on the Monterey Peninsula.

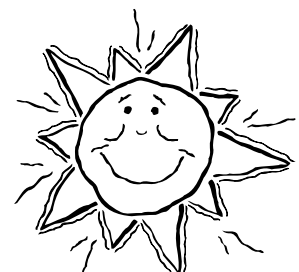

GENERAL EDUCATION INFORMATION

The California Society of Plastic Surgeons (CSPS) seeks to see beyond the traditional functions of continuing medical education, and challenges itself to become a catalyst for, an advocate for, and a provider of education that promotes improved competence, performance, and patient outcomes in plastic surgery.

Purpose: Our CME program seeks to provide high-quality, evidence-based educational opportunities designed to advance plastic surgeon competence, enhance practice performance, and promote patient safety to ultimately improve patient outcomes in the populations served by the plastic surgeons we educate.

Content: Our educational offerings include, but are not limited to, updates in clinical plastic surgery (aesthetic and reconstructive), reviews of current or best practice recommendations for plastic surgery care, evaluation of new and emerging technologies and techniques in plastic surgery, as well as patient safety.

Target Audience: We seek to serve not only the educational needs of plastic surgery healthcare professionals (board-certified plastic surgeons, plastic surgery residents and fellows, nurses and office staff) involved in the provision of plastic surgery services within the state of California, but the needs of local, regional, and national healthcare professionals and colleagues as well.

Types of Activities: As a CME provider for the largest plastic surgery state society in the country, the CSPS' educational activities include, but are not limited to, lectures, panel sessions, paper presentations, clinical round table discussions, and instructional courses. The educational design, instructional method and learning format for each event is chosen to best serve the educational needs and learning objectives of the planned educational activity.

Expected Results: We expect participants to report improved competence as expressed by greater confidence and knowledge in their approach to clinical problems or by an intent to change their behavior and apply newly acquired strategies in their practice. We expect participants will have greater confidence they are delivering care that promotes patient safety. In addition, if evaluated within the clinical practice setting, we expect improved performance parameters or a favorable impact on patient outcomes.

The General Sessions will consist of panel presentations on timely subjects which affect the plastic surgery specialty. Papers will also be presented during the general sessions. These papers are on various clinical topics and include summaries of research, observations based on experience, clever tricks to handle difficult problems, new instrumentation, development of new technologies, trends, statistics, safety issues and other comments about clinical practice that may be of value. The CSPS will also address cultural and linguistic competency issues and is dedicated to providing the participants with the necessary data, assessment tools and the development of resources plastic surgeons may use in their practices to address these issues.

The overall objective of the general sessions is to present topics related to the core body of knowledge for plastic surgery, as well as increasing quality in the health care delivery system. The content will also cover innovative, recent and new research related topics of importance to the practice of plastic surgery.

The instructional course will address the topics of ACLS Training Course, and a CPR course.

All recommendations presented and scientific research presented must be based on evidence accepted within the profession of plastic surgery and must conform to the generally accepted standards of experimental design, data collection and analysis.

There will be question and answer sessions provided for each activity and we encourage you to use this time to address a difficult case you may have, query the speakers on their techniques, etc.

The CSPS takes responsibility for the contact, quality and scientific integrity of its CME activities. As such, the CSPS follows the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education's Standards for Commercial Support. At the conclusion of this activity, participants should be able to: 1) identify pre/peri/post-op complications associated with blepharoplasty; 2) describe techniques for addressing the following problematic areas: eyelid aperture alterations, hollowness of the eyelid, lateral canthus webbing and those of ectropion and entropion; & 3) identify the surgical rehabilitation options in the event an untoward event has already occurred or is present in a patient operated on elsewhere and referred to your office.

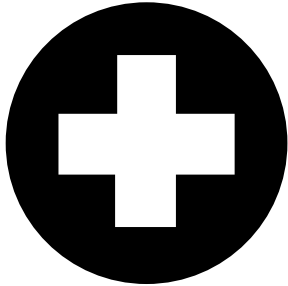

Please review the following for a brief overview of the Foundation.

MISSION: The California Society of Plastic Surgeons Educational and Research Foundation (CSPSERF) was incorporated in California as a not-for-profit public charity meeting the criteria of IRS Section 501 (c) (3). The mission of the Foundation is to identify and pursue, through directed research, education, and charitable contributions, various issues relevant to the advancement, effectiveness and safety of plastic surgery.



INITIAL FOCUS: The CSPSERF intends to focus its initial efforts on providing reconstructive surgery to California's children, age 18 and under, who demonstrate a need for such services. Participation will be open to the public, meaning all California children under that age of 18. There will be no fee for participation.

This initial CSPSERF program will be focused on the uninsured and underinsured children of California. While CSPSERF envisions that ultimate decisions regarding the need for surgery will be made on a case-by-case, fact-specific basis, it is also envisioned that the income guidelines of the California Health Family Program will be applied. These guidelines, for example, currently indicate that a family of six should have an income of not greater than \$71,400 in order to be eligible under CSPSERF's reconstructive surgery for children program.

A CSPSERF Committee has been formed to review and screen applications, following which recommendations will be made to CSPSERF's full Board. Ultimately, the Board will decide which families and/or children will be recipients of services under the Foundation's program aimed at providing reconstructive surgery to the child in need. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer or you know of a child that is in need of receiving care please contact Christine Pahl at (510) 243-1662 and she will forward you the necessary forms. Forms will also be available at the CSPSERF Lunch on May 28th.

MEMBERSHIP: The membership of the CSPSERF shall consist of persons, corporations or not-for-profit organizations that are interested in supporting the stated mission of this organization. Membership will not be restricted on the basis of race, religion, color, sex, age or creed. Members from the lay public are welcome and need not be plastic surgeons. Categories of membership shall consist of: (a) Charter, (b) Active, (c) Life, (d) Organizational, (e) President's Leadership Council, (f) Honorary, and the (g) Public.

LEGISLATIVELY SPEAKING, WHERE ARE WE?

TIM MADDEN, CSPS LEGISLATIVE ADVOCATE

Budget negotiations are heating up as Governor Brown continues to push the Legislature for a budget

Democrats are continuing to find places to cut including raiding county funds in the Maddy Emergency Medical Services Fund that are used to reimburse physicians for treating uninsured patients. Democrats want to use these funds to backfill the Medi-Cal program. This would result in eliminating the final reimbursement source for treating uninsured patients.

Looking beyond the budget, Legislators introduced over 2300 bills which was slightly less than 2010. There are a large number of health bills although it appears to be less than last year. I have also included a more extensive list of bills of interest that will be reviewed by the Legislative Committee and formal positions will be taken at the upcoming council meeting.

Most surprising was what bill was not introduced... a MICRA bill. Rumors were moving quickly that Assemblymember Feuer would introduce a bill but nothing was introduced. There were also expected a number of scope of practice bills to be introduced which also did not materialize.

As with every year, there are numerous "spot bills" which could be amended down the road to include the MICRA issue so we will continue to watch closely for amended bills.

SB 100 (Price) – CSPS Position – Support if Amended

SB 100 is the latest version of legislation related to issues surrounding accreditation and licensure of physician owned outpatient settings. This bill contains a number of provisions to better protect patients including improving the accreditation process for physician owned outpatient surgery settings, requiring the Medical Board of California to post a fact sheet on cosmetic surgery procedures, as well as requiring health care providers to include additional information in all advertisements.

The current version of the bill also includes a number of provisions we do not like including: oversight by the Department of Public Health (DPH) and the requirement to pay DPH licensing fees.

Key Points

- Patients are safe when receiving treatments in accredited facilities.
- A number of provisions in SB 100 help improve the accreditation process including ensuring facilities that lose their accreditation do not simply go to a different accreditation agency.
- We are working closely with the California Medical Association on amendments to address our concerns and to further strengthen the bill.

AB 1360 (Swanson) – CSPS Position – Oppose

AB 1360 is a reintroduction of AB 646 from last year which would allow health care districts to employ physicians. This bill would allow a qualified health care district to employ up to 10 physicians.

Key Points

- It is critical for the integrity of patient care in California hospitals that physicians remain independent from the corporate influence of hospital administrators and CEOs, who must answer to priorities other than patient care. By eliminating this protection for patients, AB 1360 will erode the quality of care those patients receive in California hospitals.
- The ban against the corporate practice of medicine provides a fundamental protection for patients by ensuring their physicians' sole interest is what is best for the patient.
- As hospitals gain market share in small communities, physicians not employed will likely be forced out of business and surgery centers outside the hospital will likely be forced to close. This results in fewer options for patients and increased costs as the hospital is able to charge higher rates with the elimination of competition.

AB 926 (Hayashi) – CSPS Position – Watch

This bill would allow qualified health care districts to employ no more than 50 physicians in total and no more than five physicians at one qualified health care district.

Ms. Hayashi is the chair of the Assembly Business and Professions Committee and we believe she will be looking to help negotiate a compromise between the various stakeholders.

Key Points

- These are the same as AB 1360. Our position is a Watch because we believe this bill will not move forward in its current form.

AB 895 (Halderman) – CSPS Position – Support

AB 895 would allow physicians providing emergency care services and receiving no compensation or at a reduced rate to obtain a state tax credit up to \$5,000.

Key Points

- Plastic surgeons provide emergency care services to patients that are unable to pay anything or a small portion of the cost of care.
- Providing a tax credit will help encourage plastic surgeons to continue to provide on-call coverage in the emergency department.
