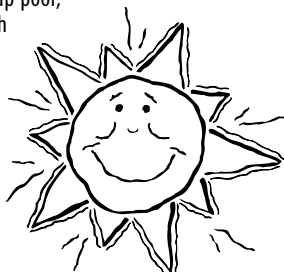

ANNUAL MEETING PROGRAM AND FACULTY

GENERAL EDUCATION INFORMATION

The California Society of Plastic Surgeons (CSPS) seeks to see beyond the traditional functions of continuing medical education, and challenges itself to become a catalyst for, an advocate for, and a provider of education that promotes improved competence, performance, and patient outcomes in plastic surgery.

Purpose: Our CME program seeks to provide high-quality, evidence-based educational opportunities designed to advance plastic surgeon competence, enhance practice performance, and promote patient safety to ultimately improve patient outcomes in the populations served by the plastic surgeons we educate. In addition, the CSPS acknowledges the importance of culture and communication for delivering effective healthcare and is committed to educating physicians to deliver culturally and linguistically appropriate care.

Content: Our educational offerings include, but are not limited to, updates in clinical plastic surgery (aesthetic and reconstructive), reviews of current or best practice recommendations for plastic surgery care, evaluation of new and emerging technologies and techniques in plastic surgery, as well as patient safety.

Target Audience: We seek to serve not only the educational needs of plastic surgery healthcare professionals (board-certified plastic surgeons, plastic surgery residents and fellows, nurses and office staff) involved in the provision of plastic surgery services within the state of California, but the needs of local, regional, and national healthcare professionals and colleagues as well.

Types of Activities: As a CME provider for the largest plastic surgery state society in the country, the CSPS' educational activities include, but are not limited to, lectures, panel sessions, paper presentations, clinical round table discussions, and instructional courses. The educational design, instructional method and learning format for each event is chosen to best serve the educational needs and learning objectives of the planned educational activity.

Expected Results: We expect participants to report improved competence as expressed by greater confidence and knowledge in their approach to clinical problems or by an intent to change their behavior and apply newly acquired strategies in their practice. We expect participants will have greater confidence that they are delivering care which promotes patient safety. In addition, if evaluated within the clinical practice setting, we expect improved performance parameters or a favorable impact on patient outcomes.

The General Sessions will consist of panel presentations on timely subjects which affect the plastic surgery specialty. Papers will also be presented during the general sessions. These papers are on various clinical topics and include summaries of research, observations based on experience, clever tricks to handle difficult problems, new instrumentation, development of new technologies, trends, statistics, safety issues and other comments about clinical practice that may be of value. The CSPS will also address cultural and linguistic competency issues and is dedicated to providing the participants with the necessary data, assessment tools and the development of resources plastic surgeons may use in their practices to address these issues.

The overall objective of the general sessions is to present topics related to the core body of knowledge for plastic surgery, as well as increasing quality in the health care delivery system. The content will also cover innovative, recent and new research related topics of importance to the practice of plastic surgery.

The instructional courses will address the topics of issues related to Practice Management, an ACLS Training Course, and a CPR course.

All recommendations presented and scientific research presented must

be based on evidence accepted within the profession of plastic surgery and must conform to the generally accepted standards of experimental design, data collection and analysis.

There will be question-and-answer sessions provided for each activity and we encourage you to use this time to address a difficult case you may have, query the speakers on their techniques, etc.

The CSPS takes responsibility for the content, quality and scientific integrity of its CME activities. As such, the CSPS follows the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education's Standards for Commercial Support. By following these standards the CSPS ensures the independence of its CME activities. LEGISLATIVELY SPEAKING, WHERE ARE WE?

TIM MADDEN, CSPS LEGISLATIVE ADVOCATE

The 2014 legislative year has begun and there were more than 2,000 bills introduced. There are a number of bills CSPS is taking a closer look at and will determine whether to support or oppose. CSPS also continues to advocate for the passage of its sponsored legislation, AB 916 (Eggman). AB 916 would limit the use of the terms "board", "certified" and "certification" to those physicians who are board certified by an ABMS board or a board approved by the Medical Board of California. Many of our members have found advertisements by physicians suggesting they are board certified when in fact they are not. As a result, patients are being confused on the qualifications of the physicians they are considering.



Although the legislative arena is heating up, all eyes continue to be on the MICRA initiative being run by the trial attorneys. The initiative proposes to increase the cap on non-economic damages from \$250,000 to more than \$1.1 million and that number would increase each year based on cost of living adjustments. The authors of this initiative

purposely threw in drug testing of doctors to disguise the real intent, which is to increase the limits on medical malpractice awards so that trial lawyers make even more money. The main proponent of the measure was recently quoted in the LA Times: "The drug rules are in the initiative because they poll well, and the backers figure that's the way to get the public to support the measure. 'It's the ultimate sweetener,' said Jamie Court, head of Consumer Watchdog."

Californians Allied for Patient Protection (CAPP) is the organization funded by supporters of MICRA to fight any attempts to change the law. This group has raised over \$31 million to fight the initiative and has commitments up to \$60 million.

On April 1st, the CSPS leadership had a lobby day in Sacramento to speak with them on legislative issues including AB 916. This was a great opportunity for the CSPS to help explain to Legislators the intricacies of your medical practices and the importance of passing legislation which protects your patients.
