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CSPS PRESIDENT, STEVEN A. TEITELBAUM, MD INVITES YOU TO JOIN US FOR THE 66TH CSPS ANNUAL MEETING

Dear Colleagues and Friends :

This year's annual meeting will be over Memorial Day Weekend in Santa Monica, nearby to the beach, the amusement park at the pier, world famous restaurants, movie theaters, shopping, major highways, and airports. With excellent programs in the morning and optional courses in the afternoon the CSPS Annual Meeting has long been a great meeting to bring your entire family. This location is optimal for that tradition.

The program includes both reconstructive and aesthetic surgery with a unique approach: all panels will include lectures about the current uses of autologous fat. The faculty includes the most prominent names in these topics worldwide as well as the experts in California. Substantial discussion time has been set aside during each panel - so bring your questions – or tell the panelists what you think about them!

CSPS remains the largest state plastic surgery organization. We owe that to the hard work of our leadership since the organization was founded in 1951. The momentum has continued through the creative and diligent work of our Executive Director, Christine Pahl. When you see her at the meeting, introduce yourself and say hello. She will be happy to meet you.

The physicians who founded this group were quite prescient in their thinking, as medicine has ended up being regulated more on a state than a federal level. Our legislative advocate Tim Madden is one of the most effective lobbyists and he would welcome meeting you and discussing issues of your concern. Our attorney Douglas Free is a health care law expert and will be here throughout the meeting and is always eager to say hello.

In the past year CSPS has been dealing with other challenges and quality improvement issues, such as inspection of operating rooms, disclosure of physician qualifications, issues about balance billing, and many more. Controversial legislation has been announced which will require further work this year. Your participation is eagerly welcomed, so let us know if you wish to be involved.

A great source of pride for CSPS this year is that we will hold five of the six most important national presidencies: Debra Johnson: ASPS, Dan Mills: ASAPS, Mary McGrath: AAPS, William Hoffman: ASMS, and I am president of ASERF. No state has ever so dominated the national stage of plastic surgery and it is a tribute not just to the dedication of California's plastic surgeons, but to the presidents who have preceded guided us – as well as Christine who has helped develop our careers in leadership.

This year has also been a painful one with the loss of two past CSPS presidents, inspiring program directors, and giants of our specialty: Lars Vistnes and Harvey Zarem. Harvey was my mentor and it pains me to know I will never experience his wit, civility, charm, brilliance, and "sechel" again.

ANNUAL MEETING PROGRAM AND FACULTY

GENERAL EDUCATION INFORMATION

The California Society of Plastic Surgeons (CSPS) seeks to see beyond the traditional functions of continuing medical education, and challenges itself to become a catalyst for, an advocate for, and a provider of education that promotes improved competence, performance, and patient outcomes in plastic surgery.

Purpose: Our CME program seeks to provide high-quality, evidence-based educational opportunities designed to advance plastic surgeons' knowledge, competence, enhance practice performance, and promote patient safety to ultimately improve patient outcomes in the populations served by the plastic surgeons we educate. In addition, the CSPS acknowledges the importance of culture and communication for delivering effective healthcare and is committed to educating physicians to deliver culturally and linguistically appropriate care.

Content: Our educational offerings include, but are not limited to, updates in clinical plastic surgery (aesthetic and reconstructive), reviews of current or best practice recommendations for plastic surgery care, evaluation of new and emerging technologies and techniques in plastic surgery, as well as patient safety.

Target Audience: We seek to serve not only the educational needs of plastic surgery healthcare professionals (board-certified plastic surgeons, plastic surgery residents and fellows, nurses and office staff) involved in the provision of plastic surgery services within the state of California, but the needs of local, regional, and national healthcare professionals and colleagues as well.

Types of Activities: As a CME provider for the largest plastic surgery state society in the country, the CSPS' educational activities include, but are not limited to, lectures, panel sessions, paper presentations, clinical round table discussions, and instructional courses. The educational design, instructional method and learning format for each event is chosen to best serve the educational needs and learning objectives of the planned educational activity.

Expected Results: We expect participants to report improved knowledge and competence as expressed by greater confidence and knowledge in their approach to clinical problems or by an intent to change their behavior and apply newly acquired strategies in their practice. We expect participants will have greater confidence that they are delivering care which promotes patient safety. In addition, if evaluated within the clinical practice setting, we expect improved performance parameters or a favorable impact on patient outcomes.

The General Sessions will consist of panel presentations on timely subjects which affect the plastic surgery specialty. Papers will also be presented during the general sessions. These papers are on various clinical topics and include summaries of research, observations based on experience, clever tricks to handle difficult problems, new instrumentation, development of new technologies, trends, statistics, safety issues and other comments about clinical practice that may be of value. The CSPS will also address cultural and linguistic competency issues and is dedicated to providing the participants with the necessary data, assessment tools and the development of resources plastic surgeons may use in their practices to address these issues.

The overall objective of the general sessions is to present topics related to the core body of knowledge for plastic surgery, as well as increasing quality in the health care delivery system. The content will also cover innovative, recent and new research related topics of importance to the practice of plastic surgery.

The instructional courses will address the topics of issues related to Blepharoplasty, an ACLS Training Course, and a CPR course.

All recommendations presented and scientific research presented must be based on evidence accepted within the profession of plastic surgery and must conform to the generally accepted standards of experimental design, data collection and analysis.

There will be question-and-answer sessions provided for each activity and participants are encouraged to use this time to address a difficult case you may have, query the speakers on their techniques, etc.

The CSPS takes responsibility for the content, quality and scientific integrity of its CME activities. As such, the CSPS follows the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education's Standards for Commercial Support. By following these standards the CSPS ensures the independence of its CME activities. LEGISLATIVE SESSION 2016-2017

California's budget picture continues to look good as Governor Brown released his budget earlier this year with strong budget surpluses. The Governor's budget has him building up his rainy day fund with the surplus revenue. He has stated we are at the end of economic rebound and should be prepared for the inevitable pull back. The budget discussions are now turned over to the Legislature where they have been signaling the desire to fund a number of cuts made during the recession. This should include increasing Medi-Cal provider reimbursement rates.

We are now in full swing of the second year of the two-session of the California Legislature. There were nearly 2,200 bills introduced in the second year while there are still approximately 600 bills left over from 2015 that are still alive. Reviewing the bills, I found a number of bills related to healthcare but a few topics were suspiciously

absent. As usual, there are numerous "spot" bills which do not contain any specific legislative language. These may be amended into bills we will want to take a position.

The two areas of legislation we expect this year are around the scope of practice expansion for nurse practitioners and legislation impacting outpatient surgery centers. These should be coming in the next few months.

Here are a few bills CSPS will be taking a position on:

AB 1795 (Atkins) – Tentative CSPS position – Support

This bill provides that treatment for services under the Breast and Cervical Cancer Treatment Program be covered for the duration of the period of treatment due to a diagnosis of breast cancer or cervical cancer, rather than 18 months for breast cancer and 24 months for cervical cancer as allowed by current law. Additionally, this bill expands eligibility for breast cancer screening under the Every Woman Counts program to symptomatic women under age 40.



SB 1252 (Stone) – Tentative CSPS position – Oppose

This bill would require that when a scheduled medical procedure is performed on a patient, the general acute care hospital, surgical clinic, and the attending physician must provide the net costs to the patient, in a written notification, the following information: (1) Applicable copayment, coinsurance or deductible. (2) The full cost of the medical procedure. (3) The range of costs for a stay in a general acute care hospital or surgical clinic. (4) A complete and precise breakdown

of the portion of the bill the health plan or health insurer will pay and what portion of the bill the enrollee will pay. Failure to do so would constitute unprofessional conduct.

AB 1992 (Jones) – Tentative CSPS position – Oppose

Would allow a chiropractor, naturopathic doctor, or NP to perform physical exam on student.

SB 1033 (Hill) – Tentative CSPS position – Oppose

This bill would require physicians to disclose to patients their probation status and have the patient sign a form confirming they saw the information. The probation status required to be disclosed would be when the physician had been placed on probation for gross negligence, drug or alcohol abuse and other situations identified in the bill.

AB 2744 (Gordon) – Tentative CSPS position – Oppose

This bill is sponsored by Groupon whose business model is focused on offering large, discounted services to a specific business in exchange for advertising that business to Groupon's followers. However, this business model flies in the face of anti-kick and self-referral laws which prohibit a physician from offering discounted services in exchange for referrals of patients.
